Straight-A student earns scholarship

DELAND — Atlantic High School freshman Sara Gaver has been designated the first Volusia County student to benefit from a partnership between FUTURES/Take Stock in Children and ChairScholars Foundation, a national scholarship program for students with physical disabilities.

Sara, a Port Orange resident and daughter of Erin and Gregory Gavers, Jr., is a straight-A student who carries a heavy academic load, including several honors classes. Upon graduation, she will receive tuition equivalent to two years of community college and two years of college at a Florida public university.

Sara has a rare disorder, arthrogyriposis, which restricts her to a power wheelchair, but rather than focus on what she cannot do, Sara prefers to focus on what she can do. Her dream is to become a teacher so she may encourage others "to overcome obstacles in life . . . the sky is the limit."

FUTURES/Take Stock in Children has been mentoring Volusia County high school students for 14 years. During that time, ChairScholars has been funding scholarships nationwide, including several counties on Florida's west coast.

Following the recent partnership, the two programs will expand scholarships offered in Volusia County.

Take Stock targets students who have impressive academic records, despite dealing with multiple issues that could overwhelm those with less determination.

ChairScholars seeks students with the same profile, plus the added challenge of overcoming a physical disability that impairs mobility.
